NSCAG September Workshop - "Nicaragua: Truth Versus Lies"

Nicaragua is constantly demonised by mainstream media, Nicaragua's right-wing opposition and those who accept its mischaracterisations at face value. Since the violent, U.S.-directed coup attempt in 2018, it has been very difficult to find objective analysis of the political situation in Nicaragua in mainstream media, much less any examination of the Revolution's achievements. In disregarding what is actually happening in the country, the media is ignoring and excluding the lived experience of ordinary Nicaraguans, as if their daily lives are irrelevant to any judgment about the direction the country is taking. Infant Mortality Cut in Half

The Sandinista Government has reduced infant mortality by 56.5%, from 29deaths per 1,000 live births in 2006 to 12 deaths per 1,000 live births in 2022. To achieve this goal, the Ministry of Health has implemented many actions such as attending ten times more births in hospitals and health centres. In 2006, 9,000 women were cared for in maternity wait homes prior to giving birth while in 2022 that number had increased to 71,925, eight times more. Fifty maternity wait homes existed in 2006; in 2022 there are now 181 maternity wait homes. Meanwhile, more than one million families have been visited house to house through the follow-up programme for children with low birth weight. Securing land rights for those who are impoverished, recognising the historical rights of Indigenous and Afro-descendant people – a Nicaraguan Success Story

In 2007 the Sandinista government inherited an 'archipelago' of property rights structures including a chaotic land registry. This mess created property insecurity particularly for small scale farmers on land with no titles. It also left the door wide open for corruption linked with land trafficking. The government has addressed these complex issues though all state institutions working together to set up a well-integrated framework prioritising those most impoverished, gender equity, and the historical rights of indigenous and Afro-descendant peoples. According to a World Bank report 'a major achievement under the strategy is a consolidated land administration framework in targeted areas that has strengthened the population's property rights through improved regularization, titling, and registry services.'

- * Between 2013 and 2020 this benefited 935,813 people of whom 50 % are women.
- * Five protected areas were successfully demarcated and geo-referenced
- * The new National Integrated Registry Information System has been completed and has so far been implemented in Managua and Estelí, two of the most important areas for Nicaragua's economy.

Sanctions

On June 8 this year, US Senators Marco Rubio and Tim Kaine introduced legislation which would extend the US government's authority to impose sanctions on Nicaragua through December 31, 2028. The bill is now in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee with no vote taken yet. These enhanced sanctions, which once more aim to destabilise the country and bring about 'regime change' – will only serve to cause harm to the poorest and most vulnerable in the country.
